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1) Webinar: Inclusion in dementia research

DRNI are thrilled to announce an extended webinar, **Inclusion in dementia** research.

Taking place **10.00-11.30 on Monday, 16 June**, this webinar will hear from three speakers:

- **Professor Naaheed Mukadam**, University College London, will speak on *Underrepresentation of minoritized ethnic participants in dementia research*, providing details of underrepresentation of minoritized ethnic participants in dementia research and proposed inclusive research practices to overcome this.
- **Dr Sarah Cullum**, University of Auckland/GBHI, will present *Living with dementia in Aotearoa (LiDiA)*, on the extent and impact of dementia in New Zealand's major ethnic groups;
- **Dr Georgia Richard**, Trinity College Dublin, will present findings from her PhD research, *Cognitive Impairment in People Experiencing Long-Term Homelessness, Evidence and Relationships (CIPHER)*.

Postgraduate Studies in Dementia / Older Person Rehabilitation

The Centre for Gerontology and Rehabilitation, University College Cork offer two flexible, interdisciplinary programmes run by Professor Suzanne Timmons: 1) Dementia; and 2) Older Person Rehabilitation.

There are three streams of study available for each of the two courses: Masters; Postgraduate Certificates; and Individual CPD modules. 
MSc Dementia

8) Embedding PPI in Postgraduate Health Research

The **Alzheimer Society of Ireland** have collaborated with **PPI Ignite** and cross-sector stakeholders to develop a **Postgraduate Introduction to PPI Module**. Now available to postgraduate students in University College Cork and Royal College of Surgeons, Dublin, the purpose of this interactive workshop-based module is to introduce postgraduate students to the ethos and practices of meaningful and authentic PPI in health and social care research.

Members of the **Dementia Research Advisory Team** (DRAT), Brenda Buckley, Kevin Cullen, Nuala Paley and Kevin Quaid co-delivered the workshop PPI: Partnering with Individuals. Drawing on their personal experience as PPI Contributors, the DRAT members shared insights as to why individuals become involved in PPI in research, some of their expectations and motivations when partnering with a researcher, and what makes for good and bad PPI. Ultimately, they stressed to the students the fundamentals of successful PPI engagements and how these are always underpinned


